
Two activities based on aphorisms

Introduction

An aphorism is "a concise statement of a principle or truth, usually an observation about life; a maxim. Aphorisms can be both witty and insightful.¹" These characteristics make them an interesting genre for language learning and, because of their brevity, suitable for lower levels. Below are two examples of how aphorisms can be used in the classroom.

The first activity is based on aphorisms about books. In the pre-reading phase, students fill in the questionnaire about their reading habits and discuss them with a partner. After a short round of feedback, the teacher tells the students that the drawings relate to aphorisms and that an aphorism is a short statement that expresses an idea in a concise and coherent way. The students then match the drawings to the aphorisms.

The second activity is about aphorisms about cats and dogs. During the pre-reading activity, students discuss the questions. Useful animals are guard dogs, guide dogs, rescue dogs, therapy dogs and cats. After a short round of feedback, the teacher tells the students that the drawings relate to aphorisms and that an aphorism is a short statement that expresses an idea in a concise and coherent way. The students then match the drawings to the aphorisms.

There is no aphorism for picture b. The teacher asks the students to think of an aphorism that fits the picture.






